## STUDENTS IN GRADES 3-9 INVOLVED IN MEAP TESTING

All students in grades 3 - 9 have been taking the state of Michigan Educational Assessment Program Test. Overall, the MEAP tests the following subject areas: Math, Writing, Science, and Social Studies. The final days of testing are Tuesday and Wednesday Oct. 18 & 19 with subjects of Math, Writing, Science and Social Studies. Reading and half of the Writing were completed this week.

Thanks to parents for making sure that students are in school on the testing dates. Results of these tests are used by the teachers as one assessment of how BICS students are mastering the Michigan grade level curriculum. Typically BICS students score above state and local averages on

the MEAP tests with most students scoring proficient.

The results of this year's MEAP testing will likely look a little different as the state has raised the bar in terms of what it takes to be deemed 'proficient'. According to State Superintendent Mike Flanagan, *"We aren't making the test tougher. What we're doing is asking kids to get more of the test items correct to be deemed proficient"*.

Other changes are on the way with state testing as Michigan joins 41 other states in adopting Common Core State Standards in Math and English Language Arts. By 2014 the MEAP and other state assessments will be aligned to these new curriculum standards.

## END OF 1<sup>ST</sup> MARKING PERIOD AND CONFERENCES

The first marking period ends with a half-day of school on Friday, November 4, 2011 and all Students will be dismissed at 11:25.

If parents want a heads-up on where grades are likely to be at the end of the marking, parents of students in grades 6 - 12 can check student grades online - if you do not know how to do this, please check with your student or with a teacher to learn how.

Teachers will finalize grades on Friday afternoon and report cards will be printed on Monday, November 7, 2011.

Parent- teacher conferences will be held on Monday, November 7 beginning at 2:15. Parents will receive a conference schedule the last week of October.

## ELEMENTARY LUNCHES

## WORLD LANGUAGE REQUIREMENT MET THROUGH BLENDED INSTRUCTION

Current state of Michigan high school graduation requirements dictate that all 2016 graduates complete 2 credits of world languages; the two credits must be completed in the same language. The district does not have a teacher with foreign language certification and searched for a world language teacher during the summer of 2011, but was unsuccessful in

finding a qualified candidate. To solve the problem, a unique combination of proven on-line instruction will be blended with weekly video chat sessions with a certified mainland (Pellston Public Schools) teacher who will also be on site once every 3 weeks to meet face-to-face with students. When the teacher is on-site, he will also do Spanish lessons with the K-8 students.

## YOUNGEST AND OLDEST STUDENTS “DIG IN”

Juniors and seniors at BICS are working with PK and Kindergarten students in an archeological dig under the direction of teachers Miranda Rooy and Adam Richards. The students will be digging for a couple of hours a week for six weeks. The site was previously documented by Dr. Joe Chartkoff, retired professor of archaeology at MSU. The

location is on state records as the Joe West cabin site. The students will also be cleaning up any artifacts they find and will produce a report to be submitted to the state and kept in its records. Teachers Rooy and Richards were members of an on-island archeology course as part of a group from Notre Dame University led by Professor Deb Rotman.

## OFFICIAL K-12 COUNT IS 69

The school's current enrollment is 72 when you include the 3 preschoolers who attend with the kindergarteners three mornings per week. School enrollment has fluctuated over the past 50 years, with a low of 53 students in the 1976-77 school year and a high of 101 in the 1995-96 school year when enrollment jumped by 18 students in one year. The jump was directly related to a large logging operation at the time, and enrollment dropped back in the following years. The average student enrollment for the last 50 years is 72. Welcome to the Pryor family who recently moved to Beaver Island. Students, 6<sup>th</sup> grader Paige, 8<sup>th</sup> grader Taylor and 11<sup>th</sup> grader Michael enrolled at BICS a week ago.

The younger students are still required to solve them manually, of course. But they can use the calculator to check their work.
